

The Client:

The Whee Wagon program, conceived and developed by the Western Carolina University School of Nursing, is a student-run program that aims to donate wagons to medically fragile children as a mode of transportation and distraction from their conditions. These wagons allow kids to play and just be a kid, while also improving their overall health status. Research has shown that kids at play have an increase in their overall health status due to play time. In turning to Catamount Communications for help, the challenge was to help the program grow by creating promotional material. In Spring 2016 the program worked with Catamount Communications and a flyer and brochure were created; however, there was more material that still needed to be developed.

The Solution:

After an initial communications assessment, a plan was to first create a website for the program. Other suggested items were a social media page and an article about the wagons medical use. The purpose for the website and other suggestions were to bring awareness to the non-profit program. The goal was to generate higher donation levels, grow the number of sponsored and donated wagons, and most importantly, help change the lives of the children under pediatric care.

The Results:

Over the course of the Fall 2016 semester, a specific brand identity was developed continued and marketing materials were a continued asset to the program. The website took form of the brand identity established during the previous semester. The website included information about the program, the wagons impact, an area to donate, and also to be able to request a wagon. We were also able to put together a

news story about a grant the program was able to accept this semester; however, it was not published. The efforts made this semester will allow the program to move forward in their efforts to better the lives of medically fragile children.

Whee Wagon Accepts Grant

WCU's School of Nursing Whee Wagon Program accepted a \$1,000 grant on Sept. 8, 2016. This grant was given as a part of the 2015 Thrift Shop Grant Awards presented by the Great Smokies Health Foundation.

"This grant will supply 3-4 IV wagons to medically fragile children," said Susan Hester, program coordinator. "These children are dependent on infusion pump therapy in Jackson or Swain counties."

This is the second year the foundation has given out these grants. This year the foundation will have given out \$99,886 in grants to local charities. The wagon program received its grant as a part of the Jackson county thrift shop giving. Swain county charities will receive their grants on Sept. 16 at the Swain Country Thrift Shop.

Where Wagon is a program that seek to provide IV pole wagons to families or facilities with medically fragile children. The wagons provide safe travel and a form of distraction therapy that is proven to help improve overall health of children.
