

Re-building a SoTL Culture: A Scaffolded Academy Model to Promote SoTL Practice, Use, and Growth



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INTRODUCTION

To sustain and expand the Scholarship of Teaching and Learning (SoTL), many institutions need fundamental cultural shifts. This case study describes the design and pilot implementation of the SoTL Academy: A three-semester, scaffolded program to advance SoTL practice at a regional public university in the southeastern United States.

Although our institution has a strong history of engagement in SoTL, and this form of scholarship is recognized in tenure and promotion guidelines, recent years have seen limited institutional initiatives dedicated to formally supporting SoTL work. To re-build our SoTL culture, two Educational Developers and two Faculty Fellows collaboratively designed the SoTL Academy model, creating three sequential components: a Faculty Learning Community (spring 2025), a SoTL Design Institute (summer 2025), and a Collaborative Writing Initiative (fall 2025). The Academy was designed to provide a sustainable institutional infrastructure that included comprehensive education, peer connection, and sustained support. Interdisciplinary in nature, the SoTL Academy promoted SoTL's value in the intellectual study of teaching and learning, encouraged reflective practice, and supported faculty throughout the entire SoTL process: from initial project conception through optional public dissemination. Surveys administered after each component measured program outcomes and participant experiences. Survey results will be shared, as will our plans for the next iteration of the SoTL Academy. This study responds to the gap in the literature noted by Taggart, Wheeler, and Cruz (2024), who highlight the lack of research demonstrating the impact of intensive SoTL initiatives.

This presentation responds to Grand Challenge #5 (Scharff et al., 2023) by strengthening SoTL practice through the SoTL Academy and collaborative partnerships among faculty, staff, and educational developers to sustain SoTL at our institution and beyond. By making our research public, we contribute to the scholarship of educational development, extend the body of SoTL knowledge, and make SoTL work at WCU visible.

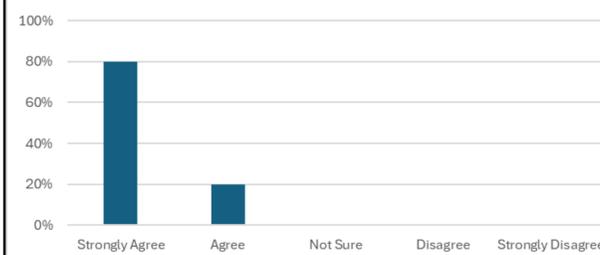

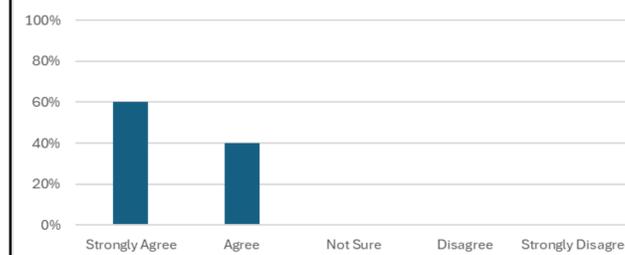

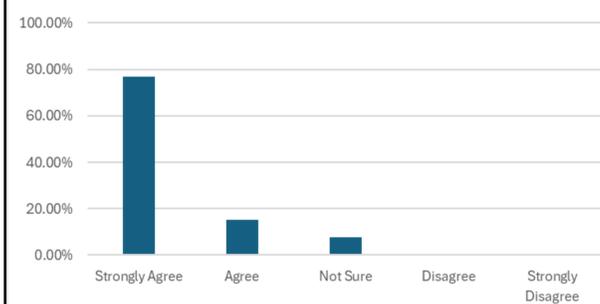
My involvement in the SoTL FLC has increased my interest in reading research on teaching and learning.



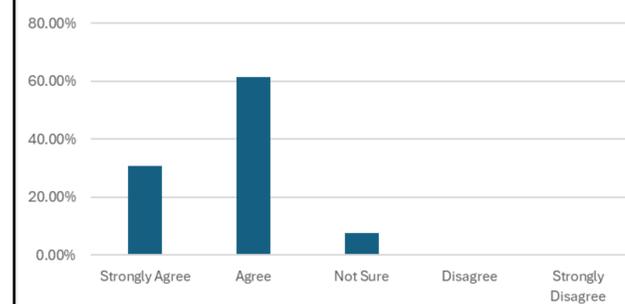
Participating in the SoTL FLC increased my confidence that I can use SoTL to improve my teaching practices.

CONCLUSIONS & RECOMMENDATIONS

- WCU is a teaching- and student-centric university. Literature shows that SoTL is beneficial to faculty, their students, and their institution.
- Results suggest that the SoTL Academy provided infrastructure and support to pursue SoTL studies.
- Components of the SoTL Academy increased teaching and learning interest, confidence, and self-reflection
- Most participants reported the SoTL Design Institute will help with tenure and promotion.
- The next iteration begins Summer 2026 and has been adapted based on survey results and feedback from participants.
- Recommendation: Institutional support for SoTL initiatives provides a return on investment. Resources should be devoted to the SoTL Academy. Outcomes should continue to be measured.

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
