With this our sixth annual report, we celebrate not just the Center's past year but also our many years in operation.

Since launching in Spring of 2017, CSFE has supported 71 faculty projects and 118 student projects. We have published 14 original studies in our flagship series, CSFE Issue Briefs—Hard Research, Easy Reading, plus related op-eds in North Carolina and national papers. In addition, our first six years have provided 40 real and virtual events with a total of 3,747 attendees. We have hosted memorable conversations with Apollo 16 astronaut Charlie Duke, Home Depot co-founder Ken Langone, and author of We Need to Talk Celeste Headlee, among many more. We host annual research workshops and year-end community programs for our region, including our 2019 Opioid & Addiction Awareness Campaign and

Town Hall, when we welcomed Senator Shelly Moore Capito (R-WV), North Carolina Senator Jim Davis (R), and a large group of academics and community members, and our four-part 2021 COVID-19 virtual series that drew national audiences.

Through these programs and more, CSFE has developed a network that gathers over one hundred faculty and students from WCU and beyond, integrating them with community members and policymakers from the southeast region. By combining perspectives from economics, accounting, engineering, psychology, nursing, social work, and more, CSFE is a hub and platform for cross-disciplinary research that matters.

As Director, I am very thankful to work alongside the people whose talents and hard work make CSFE possible. Starting with the steady hand of WCU's administrative leadership, CSFE has depended crucially on the support of Chancellor Kelli R. Jackson D. Déziel Assistant Professor and Director EMC Program Jackson D. Déziel, PhD, MPA, NRP, is Assistant Professor and Director of the Emergency Medical Care program at Western Carolina University. Dr. Déziel began his career in 2000 in New Hampshire and has since worked as a paramedic in both urban and critical care settings. He holds a PhD in public policy from the University of North Carolina-Charlotte and a Master of Public Administration from NC State. His research interests embrace public policy on the economic incentives of unnecessary ambulance transport, social determinants of ambulance demand, and prehospital resource provision.



Turner Goins Ambassador Jeanette Hyde Distinguished Professor R. Turner Dr. Goins is the Ambassador Jeanette Hyde Distinguished Professor in the Department of Social Work. Dr. Goins received her BA in Psychology from East Carolina University and her MS and PhD in Gerontology from the University of Massachusetts-Boston. In 1998, she completed a two year National Institutes of Aging's research postdoctoral fellowships at Duke University's Medical Center with an emphasis in Epidemiology. Dr. Inhyuck "Steve" Ha's areas of interest are economics of discrimination, spatial econometrics, community economic development. economic impact analysis, and agentbased models. He has extensive experience conducting statistical analysis and understanding the complexities of real-world data. His current research projects include studying the effects of affirmative action policy in public procurement and contracting, and labor market discrimination.



Marco Lam Associate Professor of Accounting

Dr. Marco Lam holds a MA in Management Science and a Ph.D. in Operations Management from The University of Alabama and a Master of Accountancy from Western Carolina University. He is a Certified Public Account (CPA) licensed in Colorado. Dr. Lam has been widely published in such journals as the Journal of Asset Management, Advances in Accounting Behavioral Research, Strategic Finance, and International Journal of Operations and Production Management. His research interests include the use of accounting information in decision making, data analytics, and public policy.



David McCord Professor of Clinical Psychology

Dr. David McCord is Professor of Clinical Psychology. He received the B.A. in Psychology from Duke University in 1984, M.A. in Clinical Psychology from Western Carolina University in 1979, and Ph.D. in Clinical Psychology from The University of Alabama in 1984. He completed his pre-doctoral internship year in the School of Medicine, UNC - Chapel Hill in 1984. His publications and professional presentations focus generally on personality assessment and personality theory, with career-long emphasis on the MMPI family of instruments; he has recently published a book in the APA Psychological Assessment

Series, Assessment Using the MMPI-2-RF. Dr. McCord's current research program involves the development of a new-paradigm, multi-dimensional mental health screening test for use in primary medical care settings.



Emma Miller Assistant Professor, HRSA BHWET Project Coordinator

Emma Miller, MSW, LCSW is an Assistant Professor of Social Work and the U.S. Health Resources and Services Administration's (HRSA) Behavioral Health Workforce Education and Training Program (BWHET) Project Coordinator. Related to integrated care, she served as a Behavioral Health Quality Improvement Consultant to approximately 50 primary care medical practices in western NC, Cherokee Indian Hospital Authority and a hospital management firm, as well as for local, regional and state projects. Though her experience has been across disability areas, interdisciplinary, and has afforded her a lifespan perspective in many service settings, of note is her work in six pediatric practices as a

Developmental and Behavioral Health Consultant where she implemented inventive integrated models. Pertaining to pediatrics, she provided health promotion, prevention, and early intervention with children and youth with special health, behavioral and transition needs, and their families. In addition, she has held two positions in medical social work and has had other responsibilities in primary and specialty care. Additionally, she has been involved with the development of a Health Home and population-based care at Vaya Health, a managed care organization. Besides writing a training for physicians and a protocol for a primary care practice, she served on a NC Institute of Medicine Task Force and is listed as an expert in Integrated/Collaborative Care on the NASW-NC website. Lastly, she provided preconception through age five services for children/parents/families, training for professionals, and parenting products on an international scope, and has served on nonprofit boards including an international one.

Dr. Miller's research has been published in several academic journals, including *Public Choice, Intelligence, Critical Review,* and *Public Opinion Quarterly.* He has also written for *Reason, Wall Street Journal, Yellowhammer News, Al.com,* and *The American Institute for Economic Research.*



Audrey Redford Assistant Professor of Economics

Audrey Redford earned her Ph.D. in Agricultural & Applied Economics from Texas Tech University in 2016. Prior to attending Texas Tech, Dr. Redford earned her B.B.A. in Economics from James Madison University. Dr. Redford's research interests include Austrian economics, public choice, and comparative institutional analysis as tools to understand the ways in which markets adapt to changes in policy and institutional foundations. Her published research largely focuses on the unintended consequences of drug prohibition as well as interventionism and entrepreneurship in illicit drug markets.

She has published in academic journals such as *The Independent Review*, *Review of Austrian Economics*, *University of Florida Journal of Law & Public Policy*, and *Journal of Entrepreneurship & Public Policy*.
